Navy League Mourns Passing of Former National President McNeill

Georgia Icon Was 81

The Navy League of the United States is deeply saddened to announce the passing of its beloved past national president Sheila McNeill at the age of 81.

As the 42nd national president (2003–2005), Sheila held several key roles during her 58 years with the Navy League, including national vice president for legislative affairs, national director of the U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps, member of the National Maritime Policy Committee, and member of the Camden-Kings Bay Council. She was also the first and only female national president in the organization's 121-year history.



Navy League and Georgia Icon Passes Away at 81

Sheila's contributions to the sea services and her community earned her numerous prestigious awards, including the Secretary of the Navy's Distinguished, Superior, and Meritorious Public Service medals, the United States Coast Guard's Distinguished and Meritorious Public Service medals, and the U.S. Armed Forces Spirit of Hope Award. She was also the first female recipient of the Spanish Navy League's highest honor, the Golden Anchor Award.

Even outside of the Navy League, Sheila always put her nation's needs before her own. She served as a Georgia state senator representing District 3 from January 2021 to January 2023, serving on multiple committees. Before running for office, she served as the vice chairman of the executive committee for the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services, visiting 45 U.S. military installations worldwide.

"Let Freedom Ring" Independence Day Parade


As part of its July 4th festivities, the City of Marietta held its annual "Let Freedom Ring" Independence Day Parade on July 4, 2024, in which our Atlanta Metropolitan Council participated. The event featured more than 2,000 participants, about 100 units, and a street-lined crowd estimated at about 30,000 spectators. The parade began at Roswell Street Baptist Church and marched to Marietta Square, then down Cherokee Street, ending at North Marietta Parkway.

Save the Date: 249th Anniversary of U.S. Navy

Commanded by Captain Dudley Saltonstall, Alfred was flagship of Commodore Esek Hopkins's Continental Navy flotilla during the remainder of 1775 and the first four months of 1776.

On October 26, 2024, the Atlanta Council will host a special event celebrating the 249th anniversary of the founding of the U.S. Navy. The birthday event will include a dinner, area Navy command briefings, and fellowship. Event details are pending, and an announcement will be sent to members as well as posted on the Council's <u>Events Page</u> in the near future.

<u>The United States Navy's origins</u> can be traced back to the Continental Navy, which was established in Philadelphia on October 13, 1775, at the beginning of the American Revolution. The Continental Navy was instrumental in the states' victory over the British Empire, but it was disbanded after the signing of the Treaty of Paris in 1783.

This was a very busy and fruitful quarter for our Legislative Committee. Our council representatives participated in the national Navy League Legislative Affairs "Fly-in" to Washington D.C. on May 15, 2024. Appointments were scheduled with all sixteen Georgia Members of Congress.

Three of our Council members—Will Seippel, Axel Spens, and Don Giles—traveled to Washington at their own expense on May 14. Our Council LA representatives attended an orientation for all Navy League attendees conducted by our national staff at Navy League Headquarters Building on the evening of May 14. Early on May 15, participants boarded a bus and traveled to Capitol Hill. Our Georgia Briefing Teams completed presentations to all sixteen members of our Georgia delegation to the 118th Congress.

Our elected Congressional Representatives heard our grassroots voices regarding our Navy League support for legislation, particularly the 2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) that will facilitate authorization of the Sea Services' highest priority requirements. We will monitor to see how our Representatives and our Senators vote regarding provisions of the 2025 NDAA.

First Council Challenge Coin

The Atlanta Metropolitan Navy League Council has produced its first challenge coin for our organization. Proudly made in America by Wendell's Mint, just 100 coins were produced and are \$25 each. Proceeds stay local to benefit the Atlanta Council.

The coin's obverse features the NLUS seal, and the reverse features "AMC NAVY LEAGUE" arched around central gold silhouette depictions of the USS *Jimmy Carter* (SSN-23) and USS *Georgia* (SSGN-729). The edge reads "MADE in USA WENDELL'S MINT" and "W.S. 2024" to designate the initials of Council President Will Seippel, the year, and signify the coin is among the first 100 made.



Challenge coins have been an American military tradition for a century, meant to instill unit pride, improve esprit de corps, and reward hard work and excellence. Board Update

Joel "Rod" Rodriguez, CMDCM (SW/AW), Joins Atlanta Metropolitan Navy League Council Board

A native of Woodland, Calif., Master Chief Rodriguez enlisted in the Navy in January 1993. Upon completion of Basic Training and Aviation Maintenance Administrationman (AZ) "A" school in Meridian, Miss., he reported as an AZAR to the Gunfighters of Fighter Squadron (VF) 124 at Naval Air Station Miramar in San Diego, Calif. He completed his shore tour while assigned to the Grim Reapers of Fighter Squadron (VF) 101 Detachment Miramar



and became Enlisted Aviation Warfare-qualified before reporting to the USS *Boxer* (LHD-4) for sea duty.

During his first sea tour, Rodriguez was qualified as Production Control Supervisor, earned his Enlisted Surface Warfare Designation, and was meritoriously advanced to First Class Petty Officer. He then transferred to Fleet Aviation Specialized Operational Training Group Pacific (FASOTRAGRUPAC) in San Diego, Calif., where he was assigned as a maintenance program instructor, qualified as a Master Training Specialist, and was advanced to Chief Petty Officer in 2002.

His follow on tour was onboard USS *Nimitz* (CVN-68), San Diego, Calif., where he served as the IM-1 LCPO, Production Control Supervisor, and Maintenance Master Chief for AIMD in the absence of the billet during two Western Pacific deployments and a surge deployment. His follow on tour for shore duty was at Commander, Helicopter Anti-Submarine Wing, U.S. Pacific (COMHSCWINGPAC), San Diego, Calif., where he was assigned as the training and evaluation team LCPO preparing commands for the incorporation to the H-60S aircraft. He then reported to Commander, Naval Air Forces, U.S. Pacific Fleet (CNAP) for sea duty and was advanced to Master Chief Petty Officer.

Master Chief Rodriguez was selected to the Command Senior Chief Program in 2012, was the Senior Enlisted Leader for CNAP Staff, served as the Command Master Chief onboard the USS *Higgins* (DDG-76) and at his major command tour at Fleet Readiness Center Southwest (FRCSW) in San Diego Calif. His most recent CMC tour was from May 2020 to April 2022 at Commander, Fleet Readiness Centers Patuxent River, Md. He reported aboard USS *Abraham Lincoln* (CVN-72) in April 2022, from which he retired in February 2024.

Master Chief Rodriguez is a graduate of the Senior Enlisted Academy, the CMC/COB course, the MCPON Senior Enlisted Leadership Seminar, and the Naval Postgraduate School Senior Leader Seminar. He earned his associate's degree from Vincennes University. His personal awards include the Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (five awards), Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (three awards), and various service and campaign awards.

Where Are They Now?

Lieutenant Junior Grade Zachary Lee

Zachary Lee joined the United States Naval Sea Cadet Corps in 2011 with the Pathfinder Excursion Squadron in Newnan, Georgia. The following year, he attended Recruit Training at RTFL Belle Glade. It was after this experience that he truly began to take the program seriously by putting in as much as possible, and getting out as much as he could.

Over the next few years, Lee attended various trainings across the country, including: Master-at-Arms training onboard Naval Subase Kings Bay; Mixed Martial Arts in Charlotte. North Carolina; Petty Officer Leadership Academy in Newport, Rhode Island; **Recruit Training Staff in** Pensacola, Florida; Winter Survival in Steamboat Springs, Colorado; Field **Operations in Latimer,** Tennessee; and finally finishing by staffing the International Sea Cadet Exchange Program in Newport, Rhode Island.



Experiencing all of this, while advancing to the cadet rank of Chief Petty Officer taught Lee many incredible lessons about life and people. In 2015, c/CPO Lee won the William T. Schwendler Award for Excellence and was named the Most Outstanding Metropolitan Atlanta USNSCC Sea Cadet.

Following his time in the USNSCC, Lee received the Naval ROTC 4-Year Scholarship to Auburn University. During this time, he trained for four weeks



following freshman year: two weeks at Naval Station Norfolk shadowing the Surface Warfare and Aviation Communities, one week at Naval Subase Kings Bay learning about the Submarine Community, and one week onboard Camp Lejeune for Marine Corps appreciation. The following summer was spent onboard the Ohio-class submarine USS Alaska for two weeks. Lee finished his career at Auburn with a bachelor of science in Industrial and Systems Engineering, a minor in Naval Science, and



(continued) a commission in the United States Navy. He then reported to Naval Air Station Pensacola for Naval Introductory Flight Evaluation.

Then came flight school training. N.I.F.E consisted of three weeks of ground school followed by ten introductory flights in a Cessna 172. Next came Primary Flight Training at NAS Whiting Field, where he trained to fly the T-6B Texan II for thirty-two weeks.

Upon the completion of Primary, Lee selected Rotary and began Advanced Flight Training in the TH-57 *Sea Ranger*. Following thirty weeks of training, he received his Wings of Gold on August 25, 2023.



"Currently, I am a Lieutenant Junior Grade attached to Helicopter Maritime Strike Squadron Four-Zero (HSM-40) in Mayport, Florida, training to fly the MH-60R Seahawk as a Fleet Replacement Pilot," said Lee.

"I love this platform because it allows you to serve with a full crew including a co-pilot, a crew chief, sonar operators, and rescue swimmers (the finest sailors in the Navy). Our main mission is anti-submarine and anti-surface warfare, and we are the most capable maritime helicopters in the world. "I live with my wonderful and beautiful fiancée Rachel, our dog, and our cats. Upon the completion of this training pipeline, I will be assigned to one of the fleet squadrons based here in Jacksonville, Florida.

"The exposure, support, experiences, and lessons I was able to learn during my time in the USNSCC undoubtedly led me directly to where I am today. The program provided more for me than I could ever be able to pay back. I am thankful to every person I met along the way that helped me to achieve my dreams of being a Naval Aviator," Lee added.
